Notes from Community Breakfast 14<sup>th</sup> April 2023 recorded by Ray Munden

## Speaker: Sergeant Jon Vine, Hertfordshire Police

Jon gave a very informative and interesting talk about his time and role in the Hertfordshire Police force. He joined the police after leaving the RAF and has had several spells based at the Royston Police Station as well as at Hitchin, Letchworth and Codicote. He likes Royston as it is large enough to have some problems (challenges) but small enough to be able to have an effect. He has worked hard to engage with youngsters in a productive rather than a confrontational way, which seems to be working very well with a significant reduction in anti-social behaviour. Royston Police Station opened in 1991 and was very well built and designed and was intended to hold high security prisoners, of which it has held some although not great numbers. On one noteworthy occasion screens were built because of concerns over the possibility of snipers during the presence of one prisoner! There are 10 officers based at the Royston and cover a large area, spreading to Nuthampstead, Biggleswade and to, but not including, Stevenage. While the front doors were closed to the public around 12 years ago, because of changes that reduced the requirement for the public to access it such as SatNav (no need to ask for directions) and the internet (can find information easily on the web) it is always staffed and there is still a doorbell that can be rung if the need for a personal interaction arises.

Interestingly the station includes a polygraph (a lie detection system), for which Jon was a pilot trial subject and which he found surprisingly stressful despite only being a volunteer. There is a room for virtual court appearances which removes the need for officers to appear in person at some court cases, saving in time and travel costs. He said that there had been some strange occurrences at the station which, despite his strong scepticism, indicated the presence of a ghost. The occurrences ceased after an exorcism! Possibly the biggest crime problem facing police in this area has been the theft of farm machinery. The innovative use of drones, and collaboration with the Cambridge force, led to the recovery of stolen vehicles, the arrest of suspects and a significant reduction in thefts.

A recently as three years ago youngsters were causing significant problems in Royston but, as mentioned, efforts to engage them and their families in a positive rather than confrontational manner has paid dividends. There was a drive to arrange for events for the children to attend. Examples are Saturday morning free cinema at the Royston Picture Palace and acting and singing classes. With the latter, mixing stronger and troubled children has led to the stronger looking after, rather than bullying, the weaker.

A question about the control of electric scooters was raised. Jon acknowledged that there was a problem, but it was difficult to address. Partly this is because of different rules applying in different locations but also, if handled adversarially, it could have a long-term effect on the child. For example if penalised it could result in 3 penalty points being added to a driving licence, when later possessed, meaning an inability to get affordable insurance and buy a car. There was a suggestion that dog walkers can make great eyes and ears for the police. John agreed and they do have someone who normally engages with dog walkers but has been off long term sick but should return soon and restart this initiative.
